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PREFACE

Rajesh Lal

It is with immense pride that I, as the eldest son of Professor Braj Basi Lal, write this Preface.

I acknowledge at the outset that the credit for this Felicitation Volume goes to the well-known publisher, Shri Praveen Mittal. He was keen on it, and guess what! He found an exceptionally great companion to put his idea into action when he found in Ms. Neera Misra, a person who is result-oriented and so pushy that she can move a bulldozer with her thoughts! So, full credit to both of them.

It will be well to recall that the first Felicitation Volume to honour Prof Lal was titled 'Facets of Indian Civilisation: Recent Perspectives', edited by the Late Mr. Jagatpati Joshi, *et.al.* and it was published in 1997. Since then, Prof Lal has published 14 books. At present, he is writing on the 'Evolution of Civilisation in the Ganga Valley', which he hopes to finish by 2019. It is, therefore, necessary to cover this twenty-year period with another Felicitation Volume. Notwithstanding the books written, I really couldn't think of anyone who has spent seventy years without a break, either excavating, researching, writing and last but not in the least, *dreaming about archaeology*, age 96 years being a matter of body, not that of mind!

His writings in the last two decades have covered a vast array of topics. Let me try and list out their major themes.

His book, "The Rigvedic People: Invaders? Immigrants? or Indigenous?", is an allencompassing volume that takes one through the evolution of civilisation in the Sarasvati valley where the majority of sites of Harappan civilisation lie. The journey starts from Bhirrana in the fifth millennium BCE and covers the evolutionary aspects till the decay of the civilisation at the beginning of the second millennium BCE. It establishes that the Rigveda could not have been written in 1200 BCE but has to be of a time when the river Sarasvati was a 'mighty flowing river'. Writing of the Rigveda is now taken to be at the beginning of the third millennium BCE with some mandals having

been written even earlier. Also see his, "How Deep are the Roots of Indian Civilisation: Archaeology Answers".

These books tell us, logically and dispassionately, that the Rigvedic people were the authors of the Harappan Civilisation. The 'googly' of the 'Aryans' entering India from an area of 'cold climate', which had trees like birch, Scotch pine, oak, etc., was torpedoed by Prof Lal when he wrote in his book, 'The Homeland of Aryans', that none of these trees were mentioned in the Rigveda.

Needless to say that the issue of the Aryans 'if not invaders then must be immigrants' and that too 'pastoral cattle breeders' is dismissed.

The historicity of the *Rāmāyaṇa* and the *Mahābhārata* are discussed over a book each.

A book that brings to our knowledge that our culture is almost five thousand years old *and is still in continuity* is the book, 'The Sarasvati Flows On'. It tells us of the prevalence of yoga, sindūra, swāstika, namaste, etc., during the Harappan Civilisation, not forgetting some bed-time folk tales.

'Kauśāmbī Revisited' sets some records straight on the antiquity of the site and interpretation of some of its structures since the time it was excavated decades ago. 'Testing Ancient Indian Traditions against the Touchstone of Archaeology' (both books were published in 2017), narrates about ten examples of archaeological finds with respect to what has been written in the Purāṇas. Establishing this link between the 'finds' and the 'scripture' is non-negotiable insofar as Prof Lal is concerned.

The Felicitation Volume has been planned in three volumes. Volume 1 comprises listing of Prof Lal's writings that include titles of seminal papers written and books that he has written with a brief note on each book. Another section consists of review by well-known archaeologists worldwide of his articles and books. Then there is a section that introduces the reader to leading events in his life, these are mostly excerpts from his book about himself, "Piecing Together: Memoirs of an Archaeologist". The volume also contains a section called 'Reminiscences', which, of course, is a collection of personal interactions of others with Prof Lal and yet another section consisting of photographs.

Volumes 2 and 3 are papers from thirty-eight scholars who have contributed towards the Felicitation Volume. I want to make a point at this juncture. I recall Prof Lal mentioning more than a couple of years ago at a seminar that our young and upcoming archaeologists at assistant professor level or those who are doing their doctorate, notwithstanding their respective thesis, must learn to continue to research further and get into the habit of writing. I am glad to say that we have such contributors in the two volumes, 2 and 3.

My own feeling, as a son of Prof Lal combined with being an editor of his Felicitation Volume, is that of immense happiness and total satisfaction, and the reason, of course, is that we have been able to update his work and given the recognition that he so richly deserves.

I do hope that the readers will benefit from the papers presented and continue to debate the debatable issues.

INTRODUCTION

Though this is the second, but it is a much deserved and needed Felicitation Volume Set in honor of Shri Braj Basi Lal. Popularly known as Professor B.B. Lal, he is one of the most accomplished archaeologists of post-Independence India.
